

Swan Lake Nature Study Area



- Designated "Nevada Important Bird Area" by Lahontan Audubon Society in 1999.
- Over 150 bird species recorded in the area.
- Namesake is the Tundra Swan (overwinters Nov March)
- Popular birding area (open to the public year-round).

Swan Lake Nature Study Area - Master Plan




Master Plan adopted in 1997 (updated in 2000 and 2012):

Project Scope of Work







Site management challenges:


- Fluctuating water levels and flooding resulting in damaged infrastructure and loss of access to the outdoor classroom.
- Erosion of Horse Creek channel and main access road.
- Trash and sediment deposition (ditch clearing)
- · Noxious weeds.





Project Scope of Work

- Parcel acquisition (13.325-acres)
 - Bargain sale negotiated by Nevada Land Trust
- Construct raised boardwalk
- Replace 17 interpretive signs
- Design and permitting for Horse Creek restoration/flood mitigation





Project Scope of Work



Project Benefits:

- Improve ecological health and habitat diversity.
- Reduce erosion.
- Protect existing infrastructure.
- Provide year-round access to the outdoor classroom.
- Accessibility improvements including interpretive signage.
- Reduction in long-term maintenance needs.



Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant



- Awarded \$1,106,000 through the Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant Program
- 50% Match requirement (\$6,000 staff time; \$1,100,000 property value donation).
- Appraised property value (\$3,830,000); Purchase price (\$500,000); Donated value to Washoe County (\$3,330,000)
- Grant funds accepted by the BCC on September 16th, 2025





This park was supported by the Land and Water Conservation Fund which helps states and communities provide outdoor recreation and open space for all.
